
Attendance

The school undertakes regular monitoring of all absences, including holiday absences. Parents are required to either telephone the school or use the absence form on our school app if a child is unwell on the first day of absence.

To ensure the safety of pupils, the school supports this with a 'First Day' response message / call if no reason for absence is provided. We are grateful for parents' co-operation in this matter.

The Governing Body have adopted the Welsh Government Attendance Policy guidelines. All local authorities are working to improve attendance and prevent unnecessary absences. If a child's attendance drops below 96%, their potential and success is compromised.

School Development Plan 2022—2023

The school produces a SDP to highlight the priorities for the year. Last year, the priorities were as follows:



Priority 1 - To create an engaging, broad and balanced curriculum

Progress: Strong progress made.

Next Step: Maintain and further develop.

Priority 2 - To raise standards in mathematics and numeracy for all learners, focusing on the development of reasoning across the school

Progress: Good progress made with teaching and learning of mathematics across the school.

Next Step: Refine planning to ensure more meaningful applications of numeracy across the school.

Priority 3 - To raise standards in English/Literacy and Welsh for all learners, focusing on the improvement of oracy.

Progress: Good progress made with teaching and learning of English across the school. Excellent progress with reading.

Next Step: Improve standards of speaking Welsh across the school.

Priority 4 - To ensure health and wellbeing of all is a priority by ensuring pupils and staff receive the support required to enable them to progress

Progress: Excellent progress. Nearly all pupils making progress.

Next Step: Maintain and further develop, pupil-centred approach

Priority 5 -

To develop the role of leaders across the school

Progress: Excellent progress made with pupils and staff. Nearly all pupils a member of a leadership group. Staff more confident at leading curriculum areas.

Next Step: Further develop the roles of pupil leaders by formalising roles. Staff to make regular contact with link governors.



Assessment

Following the introduction of Curriculum for Wales, the Welsh Government removed the requirement to report on national Curriculum assessment.

As a school, we have our own assessment routines that form our assessment cycle. The assessment windows each year are **November** and **May.** Pupils across the school take part in paper and online assessments that help us measure progress within literacy, numeracy and non-verbal reasoning. We also regularly assess pupil wellbeing across the school.

Reporting to Parents

The school follows Welsh Government Guidance whilst reporting progress to parents. Our reporting cycle is:

- Autumn Term 1—Meet the Teacher face-to face meeting
- Autumn Term 2—Face-to-face Progress Meetings
- Spring Term—full parents' evening appointments
- Summer Term—full end of year school report with an option to request a face-to-face meeting if required.

In addition, we operate an **open-door policy** and encourage parents to contact us should there by a concern or issue.



Promotion of Healthy Eating, Health and Hygiene

Healthy eating is promoted throughout the year through curriculum learning opportunities, outlined in our RSE code.

These experiences include children cooking meals. Healthy lunchboxes are encouraged. There is a constant availability of water from the water cooler and during dinner time in the dining hall.

School health checks remain a consistent feature for our younger pupils and we work closely with external organisations to support this.

School dinners are prepared fresh, on site by our school cook. School dinners are carefully planned by Pembrokeshire County Council to ensure meals are balanced, nutritious and healthy.

Sport and Physical Activity

All pupils participate in weekly sessions both indoors and outdoors. Sporting fixtures with other schools are regular features. In addition, we ensure our pupils have the opportunity to attend most sporting events.

Additionally, we ensure pupils experience new activities such as Gymnastics, Yoga and Dance.

Environmental Enhancements

Since January 2022, we have worked hard to improve the school building and grounds. Parents make positive comments about the changes that are visible. We believe firmly that in order for pupils to learn best, the environment must be right.

Working with Pembrokeshire County Council, we have made some structural changes to building with more improvements planned over the coming months.

We are extremely grateful to parents and community members for their ongoing support with this work. Together, we have made lasting improvements that will improve learning and teaching for all.



Safeguarding

The schools lead designated safeguarding person is Mr A Davies and the deputy designated members of staff are Mrs H Callan and Mrs A Rodriguez. Mrs S Burt is the link Governor for safeguarding.

Robust recording and reporting systems are in place to ensure effective practice. All staff across the school complete annual safeguarding training and safeguarding awareness is an ongoing feature of day to day school life. Safeguarding concerns regarding pupils, parents and staff can be raised with the Headteacher and designated safeguarding leads.

Safeguarding concerns regarding the Headteacher should be raised with Mrs A Harries, Chair of Governors.

Security

The school has a perimeter security fence with controlled access systems in place. External doors are controlled access also. An intercom system is used to gain entry to the school site. Further controlled access systems were installed on most external doors (except direct classroom access doors to outside learning area) during the summer of 2023.

Complaints

The school has a Complaints Procedure policy in place that can be obtained from the school office or on our website.

Care and Support

Pupils feel safe and included at Hook C. P. School because they are able to develop strong relationships with each other as well as all adults.

They are known throughout the school and are accepted and appreciated as an individual. We believe strongly in the development of social and emotional development. This is reflected in the way in which our pupils are willing to take risks in their academic and personal lives.

Everybody in the school knows each pupil's name and can talk about each child in detail. We believe this positively impacts on achievement and results in a greater chance of success.

Children have personal targets and are encouraged to achieve these on a weekly basis. We know this routine allows pupils to move forward with their learning.

Additional Learning Needs

Mrs A Rodriguez is the Additional Learning Needs Coordinator (ALNCO). She works with all teachers and pupils across the school to ensure that each pupil is supported and receives the guidance needed to maximise potential.

Parental Communication

We encourage an open-door policy—if parents have questions or concerns, we wish to discuss these thoroughly. Our main communication app is via our **School app.** Additionally, we share much of our work on our Facebook page.
